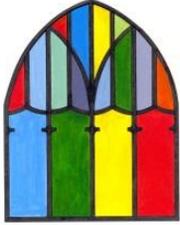

## Pastor's Message

September 2020

*Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for,  
The conviction of things not seen. Hebrews 11:1*

Are you feeling frustrated by the state of the world today? I sure am. It's easy to get caught up in all the negative things that have descended upon us these past 6-7 months: A worldwide pandemic that has prevented us from worshipping together; rioting in our country's major cities; political turmoil; and a sense of animosity among our nation's people that appears to be getting worse by the week. When in the world will this all take a turn for the better? The short answer is, "I don't know". However, I am reminded by God's word that I don't need to have the answers to the world's problems. Instead of constantly trying to find meaning in all of this, perhaps our job as God's people is to cling to Him with an even deeper sense of trust.

Hebrews 11 is one of the most famous chapters in the Bible as it chronicles the unwavering faith of many of the Old Testament saints. In fact it is often referred to as the "Hall of Faith". These men and women of old endured unbelievably harsh treatment for the sake of the gospel. And as bad as our situation here sometimes feels, it really isn't as awful as some of the trials experienced by the saints of old – which included hideous forms of death. Nevertheless, this year has been a struggle for many of us. Where can we find encouragement? How about the first three verses of Hebrews 12? Following on the heels of the "Hall of Faith", the writer puts these things in perspective for all of us:

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart.

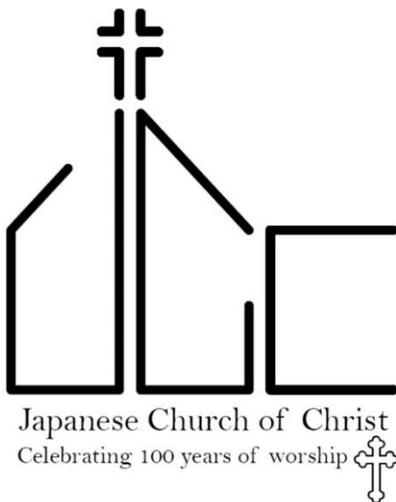

## Flu Shot Event Cancellation

In past Septembers, Community Nursing Services (CNS) conducted a flu shot event at church after worship service, thanks to the arrangements that Stephanie Mori-Nakao made for us. Unfortunately, because of COVID-19 and because church is not physically in session, the event will not be held at JCC this year. (Flu shots will also not be available through Nikkei Senior Center this season either.)

But just because the flu vaccines will not be available at JCC, please **DO get your flu vaccination** at your local neighborhood pharmacy (insurance and Medicare accepted) or doctor's office.

You may also go to the CNS Walk In Clinic at 2820 South Redwood Road, West Valley City, UT 84119. Flu shot hours are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Please bring your Medicare or insurance card with you. The cost otherwise is \$35.00.

According to one CDC study, the impact of increasing vaccination levels by just 5% could prevent up to 11,000 patients being admitted into the hospital with flu. While that range depends on the severity this season, the fact that flu cases will coexist with COVID-19 cases means that any reduction in the demand for healthcare providers is significant.



## Mail List Update

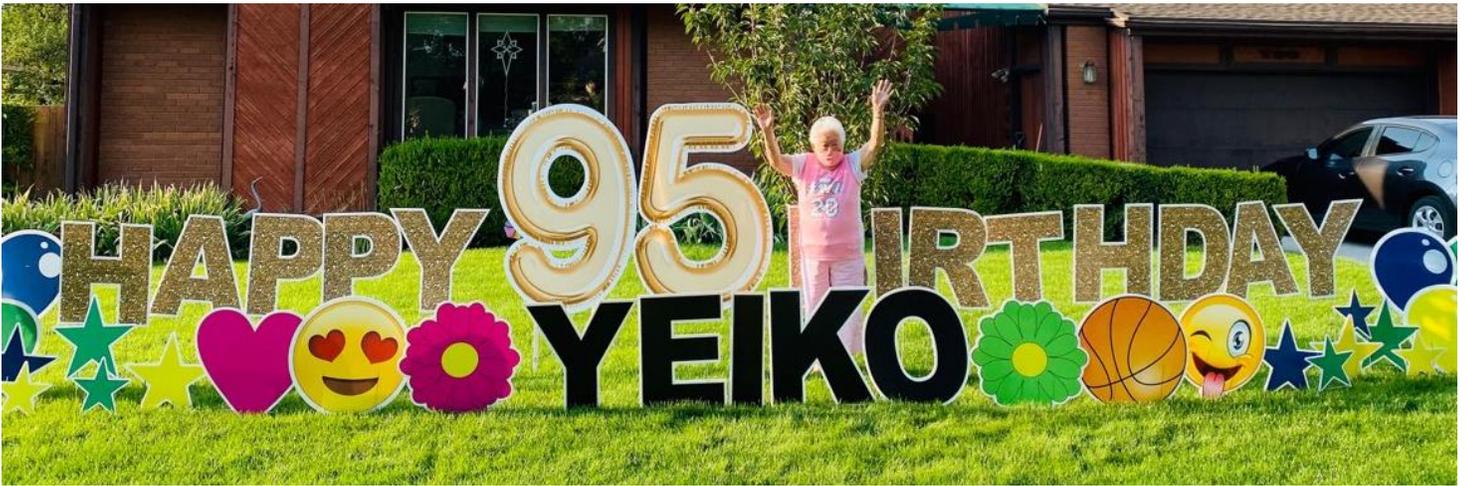

## Sheltered In Recipes

With sheltering in place, more people are cooking at home! Here are a couple of recipes to use up those tomatoes, green peppers and cucumbers in your garden that are ripening all at once! If anyone has other recipes to share during this pandemic, please send them in and they will be printed in future newsletters!

### **BEEF AND TOMATO** (Courtesy of Betty Kubota)

1 lb. tender beef, sliced thin      2 lbs. farm ripe tomatoes, cut in wedges      1 medium bell pepper, cut in chunks  
 1 large onion, cut in chunks      1 large garlic clove, minced

Fry meat and garlic in 2 Tablespoons butter or oil. Add onion and bell peppers. Cook about 2 minutes. Add tomato wedges.

### **Sauce**

1/4 c. sugar      1/4 c. shoyu      1 T cornstarch      1 T wine or sake

Combine sauce ingredients and pour evenly over the tomatoes. Do not stir. Cook uncovered over high heat, basting beef and vegetables with sauce. Tomatoes need only to be hot. Serve immediately with rice.

### **OVERNIGHT CUCUMBER TSUKEMONO** (Courtesy of Karen Okawa; mom Martha's recipe)

4 c. water      3/4 c. sugar      1/4 c. salt      1/4 c. vinegar  
 4 to 5 cucumbers, medium size

Bring water, sugar, salt and vinegar to a boil, making sure sugar and salt are dissolved. Remove from heat and cool. Peel cucumbers (do not remove all of the peel; variegate it so there are some strips of peel left on the cucumbers) and slice once lengthwise. Remove seeds. Pour cooled mixture over cucumbers in sealed container. Allow to soak in the refrigerator overnight. Cut cucumbers into thin slices.
