Pastor's Message

October 2020

I recently glanced at an article that began with a question prompted by the alarming spread of the coronavirus - "Are we witnessing the end of the world?" I have heard others ask the same question lately, and to be honest, I have wondered myself. No doubt, this year has been unlike any other in my memory. In addition to the COVID-19 pandemic, our country is experiencing massive political division that has resulted in journalism characterized by nasty and profane tirades, violent clashes and rioting in our cities, and the seeming inability of our politicians to find common ground on any issue. I even listened to a podcast where the host and his guest both suggested the possibility of civil war.

So does this all signal the "last days", when we will see the Second Coming of Jesus Christ? The short answer is, I have no idea. Jesus Himself made it clear that no one can ever predict the date of His return - That is known only by His Father. The Bible does tell us however, that our Lord could return at any time. In fact, the Apostle James wrote in the first century that the coming of the Lord "is at hand" (James 5:8). The Christian church has been waiting 2000 years for Jesus' glorious return. 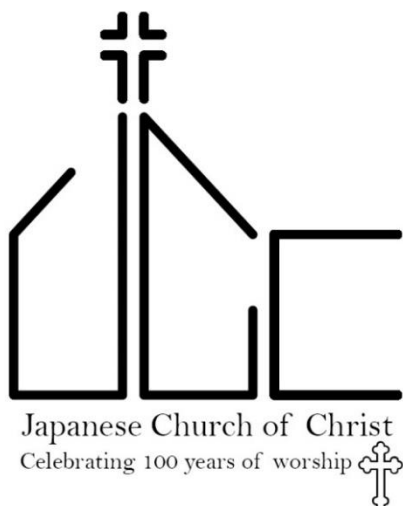
Let us all be a part of the welcoming committee.

The task force presented its draft re-entry proposal to the Session at the September Session meeting to consider what an eventual return to JCC might look like; however, due to the lengthy nature of the proposal, the Session decided to take a couple of weeks to carefully review the document and discuss it at the next meeting which is scheduled for mid October.

Hello Everyone,

In 2018, Japantown representatives participated in a facilitation process with property owners on Japantown Street and created a list of placemaking and amenities they'd like to see come to life for Japantown Street. To help get these ideas from list to design guideline phase, the Salt Lake City RDA hired a design consultant to work with the Japantown community and area stakeholders to create a set of design guidelines to provide direction for possible future improvements along the street. At the end of the process the community will have a vision and direction for how to:

- Acknowledge and celebrate the history of Japantown,
- Recognize the contributions of the Japanese American community to Salt Lake City and the region in the past and in the future,
- Improve the everyday pedestrian environment, and
- Enhance the staging of community events and festivals such as the Obon Festival, Aki Matsuri, and Nihon Matsuri and others.

The Design Consultant and a committee of Japantown community representatives have been working since the first of the year on the future of the street and have developed three options for how to reimagine 100 South between 200 West and 300 West within the vision of Japantown. The committee includes Alison Yeh Cheung, Daniel Cheung, Lorraine Crouse, Jean Irwin, Jani Iwamoto, Nathan Iwamoto-Fukumitsu, Al Kubota, Elise Mori, Judge Raymond Uno, and Elizabeth Ward.

The Japantown team asks you to attend a Community Event to review three preliminary street design concepts for Japantown Street and to provide your comments and ideas.
