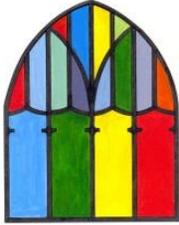

Easter Events (Virtual)

Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, we will not be able to celebrate Easter in our traditional manner for a second year in a row. But two annual services will still occur virtually – Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday.

Maundy Thursday Service – Thursday, April 1, 2021

A short virtual service commemorating the Last Supper of Jesus with his disciples. Communion will also take place at this service, so have a little grape juice and cracker on hand to participate. Easter Sunday Service – Sunday, April 4, 2021

Join us for a virtual service celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ! We will miss the Sunday School pageant of placing flowers on the cross, but a festive service is planned with special music. Communion will be given, so again, have grape juice and crackers ready. As the COVID vaccine becomes more widely available, we look forward to the not-so-distant time when we will be able to gather in person once again!



Easter 2021

As we've been working through the book of Romans each week, I hope you have been struck by the immense importance of faith in coming to know God. And yet, the expectation of faith for the believer does not stop at the point of salvation. We see how people of God are encouraged to maintain a daily faith in the Lord and His character as a means of pleasing Him as well as dealing with life's struggles.

In our celebration of Easter, we come face to face with the One in whom we place our ongoing trust – Jesus Christ, the Son of God raised from the dead so people of all ethnicities could find true liberation, peace and a confidence to keep moving forward in spite of the many trials we face.

It was the reality of a risen Savior that forever changed Simon Peter the brash and impetuous fisherman into the Apostle Peter, leader of a new religious group known as Christians. We get a glimpse of Peter's unwavering faith in Acts 5 as he faces down the religious elite of his day. After being put in prison for proclaiming the risen Christ, Peter and the Apostle are sprung from captivity by an angel of the Lord. They then return to the temple to continue teaching "the whole message of this life" (Acts 5:20). Of course the religious leaders are not happy about this and demand an explanation. Peter steps up – the man who had previously denied knowing Jesus – and says simply, "We must obey God rather than men." Peter no longer feared people or circumstances. Why? Because he had seen the resurrected Messiah, and happily submitted himself to His good and perfect will. He discovered that we are at our most secure when we look past our fears and place our focus on the goodness of Jesus.

It is my prayer for our JCC family that much like Peter, we move forward in a spirit of faith in the One Who conquered death so that we may live the abundant life that He intended for us.

The Seder Meal

The Seder Meal is the traditional meal of the Passover on Maundy Thursday. Maundy Thursday remembers how Jesus taught us how to love one another, washing our feet as a servant. The day also celebrates the Lord's Supper, remembering the meal Jesus shared with his disciples before his death.

The Seder Meal consists of the following six symbolic foods:

- **Karpas** (parsley or celery), represents hope and redemption. It is dipped in a bowl of salt water to represent tears shed by the Israelites.
- **Maror** (horseradish), is a bitter herb used to symbolize the bitterness of slavery.
- **Chazeret** (romaine lettuce or endive) is a second bitter herb.
- **Charoset** (mixture of apples or fruit and nuts and cinnamon) is a reminder of the mortar used by the Jews in construction.
- **Beitzah** (hard-boiled egg) symbolizes life and the perpetuation of existence.
- **Zeroah** (roasted lamb) symbolizes the Paschal sacrificial offering and the outstretched arm of God.
