Pastor's Message

Greetings,

I would like you to consider this great passage from the book of Hebrews. I will share a few thoughts on it; and then ask that you would take time this month to meditate on the great truths it teaches.

Hebrews 4:15-16

¹⁵For we do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are-yet he did not sin. ¹⁶Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

Let me offer you a couple of points:

1. Jesus Christ, as the God-man was tempted during His time on earth. And not just a little. The writer here says Jesus was tempted in every way, just as we are. And yet He did not sin. Why is this important to us? Well first off, because of Jesus' faithfulness, you and I have a high priest who cannot not sympathize with our own moral weaknesses. Believe it or not Jesus deeply understands the temptations we go through in our lives. In fact it is impossible for Him to not understand the trials we experience. And so what that means ultimately according to scholar Peter O' Brien is "Jesus' own experience of suffering and trials during His earthly life equipped Him so that He is able to support His people in their sufferings and temptations."

2. So with that being the case, we are then encouraged to approach His throne of grace with the confident expectation that Jesus will bless us with His grace and mercy in a way that is tied to His own understanding of trials as a man. Isn't that beautiful? More than that, it brings great encouragement and hope. Even His throne is described as being characterized by grace. When you and I find ourselves overwhelmed by all the "stuff" of life, we can immediately and without hesitation come to Jesus for help; knowing that He will provide it graciously.

I hope this passage blesses you and that you will take time in the coming weeks to let it seep into your soul.






Honorees' names will be included in the June Herald next month. All graduates will be honored during the Father's Day picnic.



Japantown Update

First South Street and Church Parking Lots *Submitted by Jani Iwamoto*

Our south parking lot is almost done! Through negotiations with the Ritchie Group, we obtained a monetary settlement last year, as well as other improvements to benefit our church, the Salt Lake Buddhist Temple (SLBT), and our street – First South.

Negotiations also include a forthcoming, further allotment for the overage of time to complete the JCC south parking lot. The SLBT had a separate settlement for its parking lot. The main reason for the parking lots, which was done in partnership with the SLBT, was so that we will be on the same level with the Ritchie Group development. In the future, we can benefit from the energy flow back and forth to our street. Our past, existing parking lot level would have been many feet higher than the new development.

Initially, the agreement was for asphalt paving (as existed prior), but we were able to negotiate the use of concrete which has many more positive aspects, including lasting for a much longer period of time. The bollards still need to be painted when weather conditions are better. Electronic arms will be installed at a significant cost and will potentially, be of great economic benefit to us.

This was an intense process for the past two years and although the development on Block 67 is on private property, other added features were also negotiated to lessen the impact for our church, including a front facing entry to a business, outside dining tables, greenery, and a yet-to-be determined mural on the apartment building's east side. A special thank you to Attorney Gary G. Sackett of the Jones Waldo law firm, whom I asked to represent our church in reviewing all documents – he did so on a Pro Bono (free!) basis. The SLBT had an attorney as well, and we worked in tandem regarding our respective parking lots. Thank you to our Session and Board of Trustees for their time and effort to affirm difficult decisions.

Now we hope to look forward, while honoring our past and our Issei and Nisei. "Okage Sama De", "I am who I am because of you", and a new vision for the future of Japantown. Many members of our church participated in this new vision which has been a process for the past year. It is a beautiful vision in partnership with Salt Lake City Redevelopment Agency (RDA) which provided for a \$100,000 study by the GSBS architect and design firm, and along, with Salt Lake County, funding in the future through tax increment. This process will take time; but we are committed to move forward, in public and private partnerships. Consul General of Japan Midori Takeuchi expressed support and excitement.

We will be planning a celebration to publicly unveil these plans - anticipate this event in the Fall of 2021.
