I was reminded however, of a book that has been on my shelf for many years. *Man In The Mirror* by Patrick Morley, is a very insightful analysis of the top 24 struggles faced by men. But not all of these "struggles" are unique to men.

The introductory chapter entitled "The Rat Race" is of particular interest to me because it seems that more and more people are susceptible to the danger of joining the rat race and losing sight of what is truly most important in life. 

Reminder - to be inside the building for church services, you will need proof of COVID-19 vaccination or a negative COVID-19 test within the last 24 hours. A COVID-19 test is <u>not</u> required if you are vaccinated.

People who do not meet these requirements are welcome to join the service outdoors or online. They will be asked to remain outside on the patio during the service and will not be permitted to enter the church buildina.

A vaccination registry is being maintained. If you have not already done so, please bring your CDC vaccination card to Allyn Nakashima. Allyn will record this information in a private file. It is not necessary to bring your card every week once you are registered. If you have any questions, please contact Allyn.

Please do not include used or damaged items, war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figurines, food, liquid or lotions, breakable items, glass containers, or aerosol cans.

"Filling" suggestions include:

- Toys: small doll, toy truck, stuffed animal, kazoo, harmonica, yoyo, jump ropes
- School Supplies: pens, pencils/sharpener, crayons, markers, stamps and ink pad writing pads or paper, solar calculator, coloring and picture books
- Hygiene Items: toothbrush, soap (placed in plastic baggie), comb, washcloth
- Other: T-shirt, socks, ball cap, sunglasses, hair clips, jewelry, flashlights (with extra batteries)

Every shoebox gift needs a \$9 donation to provide for collecting, processing, shipping, ministry partner training, and the Gospel materials that are given to the children with their gift box. # Living with COVID-19: Vaccination Update

Last week there were many changes in COVID-19 vaccination recommendations from the CDC and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP – an independent group of scientists, physicians, lay people, and other experts who advise the federal government on immunizations).

The main changes in the recommendations are summarized here:

1. Can COVID-19 vaccines be given simultaneously with other vaccines (e.g., flu vaccine)?

The initial recommendation to separate COVID-19 vaccination from other vaccines has been changed. The initial recommendation was only made because of concerns over not being able to distinguish side effects due to COVID-19 vaccine from side effects due to other vaccines. However, more data on side effects have been collected and these vaccines are very safe. Now it is considered more important to encourage people to get vaccinated and making it as convenient as possible. So now there is no longer the need to separate COVID-19 vaccination from other vaccines, e.g., the flu vaccine. It is advisable to give multiple vaccines in different locations, e.g., in different limbs.

2. When can I get my COVID-19 booster?

The initial recommendation was 8 months after the second vaccine was given. Last week this time was changed to 6 months, especially for high risk groups, e.g., elderly, immunocompromised, healthcare workers, etc.

3. Does it matter which booster vaccine I get?

Yes, you should get the same vaccine as you were initially vaccinated with. So a person initially vaccinated with Moderna vaccine should not get a Pfizer vaccine as a booster.

4. What is the availability of vaccines for boosters?

The only vaccine booster that has been approved by the FDA is the Pfizer vaccine. This is available in many drug stores and the county health departments. Moderna and Johnson & Johnson boosters should be approved very soon and are not widely available yet.

If you are not vaccinated, please consider getting vaccinated for your own safety and the safety of others!
