Pastoral Message

Presbyterians stand up for transgender youth

I am already entering my third month as your interim pastor. And while I have sat with people in great joy and in grief, our relationship is not built to last. As an interim minister, it is my mission to help JCC clean up policies and procedures, understand where you are as a church right now and what mission you are going to have in the future. Then you will be ready to call a permanent pastor. In the meantime, I have the great privilege to be available for all your pastoral needs. Feel free to reach me directly on my cell phone at 801-368-1180. I also serve as a resource for the session and all committees and groups of the church. I do not know it all, but I do know where to look and with whom to connect.

Allyn Nakashima and I had the privilege to attend the Utah Presbytery meeting in May. There, the body of Christ unanimously made an important pronouncement:

Transgender Equality Statement

Utah House Bill 11 (HB11) goes into effect in July 2022, despite initially being vetoed by Utah Governor Spencer Cox. HB11 prohibits transgender athletes in the state of Utah from participating in girls' high school sports. Although there are currently only four transgender athletes across the state of Utah who are participating in girls' athletics, the state legislature felt the need to enact such a bill and prohibit their future participation.

As the Presbytery of Utah, we strongly disagree with this law, and we fully support all transgender people, including trans youth and trans athletes. Laws such as HB11 are being enacted in a number of states around the nation. It is clear such laws have devastating impacts on transgender people, particularly trans youth. Trans youth often suffer extreme discrimination in their schools, sometimes from their families. This results in a variety of mental health challenges for trans youth, including increased suicide. We believe and affirm the God-created beauty and worthiness of every transgender person. Transgender youth, like all youth, gain benefits from participating in school athletics: leadership opportunities, better physical and mental health outcomes, self-confidence, teamwork, and most of all, fun. Trans youth should not be prevented from participating in school athletics because of who they are.

As the Presbytery of Utah, we will continue to work to repeal such laws and affirm the full humanity of transgender youth and adults, reminding our community that the love of God is for everyone, and Jesus calls us to continually share this message with the world.

Crossroads Urban Center

The Crossroads Urban Center has sent a list of the top donation needs:

Food Pantries: Chili, boxed meals, ramen noodles and snacks.

<u>Thrift Store</u>: Dishes, pots and pans, men's clothes and men's socks and underwear.

During the month of July, the organization is having a Golden Celery Food Drive, a competition between congregations to see who can give the most food per person during worship services in the month.

A box will be set up in the sanctuary for pantry donations and the Deacons will deliver the items to Crossroads.

Crossroads Urban Center is a nonprofit organization that assists Utahns with low incomes, disabilities and people of color to meet basic survival needs and address essential issues affecting quality of life.



No Host Coffee Fellowship

After we reopened to live worship service, there has been some confusion about Coffee Fellowship that follows worship service.

Due to a generous donation to the Coffee Fellowship fund and funding from Men's Fellowship, commercially prepared and individually wrapped snacks (practicing sanitary precautions), are being purchased for enjoyment after worship service for the time being.

The Deacons will be responsible for purchasing the snacks and water, and setting up and taking down the snack cart every week except the first Sunday of the month. The Nichigo group will be responsible for set up and take down on that week (as the Deacons are setting up Communion on that week) and the Deacons will be responsible for the remaining Sundays of the month. There will no longer be an assigned week for Nichigo, Agape, Deacons and Youth groups as in the past because there are not enough volunteers willing to fill each week.

However, if anyone wishes to bring a treat to share at any time, please do so! (If you would like reimbursement, just submit a receipt.) If your item is homemade, please divide and wrap into individual servings.

We wish to keep things simple though. Coffee Fellowship is meant to be a time for visiting with others while enjoying a snack or two on site; not a full lunch. Also, how about bringing your own carafe of coffee or reusable water bottle from home, so we can practice sustainability as well!

Deacons Report – June Meeting

The Deacons met on Sunday, June 5, 2022 in Pastor Haas' office. The following items were discussed:

- Sumi Arakaki funeral Services will be held on Thursday, June 16 at 11:00 a.m. at Memorial Estates Mountain View. Deacons will assist if family has need.
- Father's Day Event Provide transportation to the park for those who would like to carpool from church. Deacons will help with set up at the park.
- Discussion of Duties The Deacons have paired up into teams responsible for Communion and Coffee Fellowship set up and take down. To avoid scheduling confusion, a quarterly rotation has been set up.
- Transportation As officers of the church, we are covered for liability. But at some point, there needs to be discussion with family members on whether the Deacons should be responsible for providing transportation to church for their loved one if there are health issues or impairment.

The next Deacons meeting is scheduled for July 3.

Lock Up Reminder

If you are the last person to leave the church premises on any given day, please check that the buildings are secure. Make sure all gates are locked with padlocks and put up the chain at the front of the driveway.

Session Report – June 2022

The Session held a hybrid meeting on June 15, 2022. Pastor Daniel led a devotional about the connection between Flag Day, Juneteenth, and Swords to Plowshares events in our community. The Session will not meet in July, and our next meeting will be August 10. If you have any questions, thoughts, or suggestions, please reach out to any member of the Session!

<u>Old Business</u>: Allyn and Pastor Daniel reported that they will meet this month with Laura and leadership of **Kenshin Taiko** to start a discussion about how best to move that partnership forward.

Steve presented updated **estimates for HVAC system upgrades**. The Session voted to recommend moving forward with the Namba estimate and request the Trustees to approve this as soon as possible due to concerns about time, health, cost, and supply chain.

New Business: Allyn reported that population-level policies are unlikely to be pushed at this point and recommended that we **keep existing COVID precautions in place** because of the demographics of our congregation. Allyn will work on updating written policies.

The Session also discussed **recognition for Judge Raymond Uno, Mitsugi Kasai, and the Kato family** and voted to approve placement of plaques for Raymond Uno in memory of his mother, Mitsugi Kasai, and the Kato family in memory of Reverend Paul Kato. The Session also voted to begin working on a policy for stewardship recognition, led by the Stewardship committee.

We will look at an event in August for a **dedication of the Fellowship Hall** and to recognize these individuals.

Youth Golf Tournament Wrap

"The Youth of the Utah Presbytery Golf Fundraiser was a great success! We saw 28 people golf their way around the course of Sun Hills and enjoy lunch together, and raised \$2000 in the process.
