Session Report – March Meeting

The March Session meeting was held on Wednesday, March 15, 2023. Pastor Haas was out of town, so Candice Sweet, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Utah filled in as moderator for the meeting.

Officers were nominated and elected for Clerk of Session – Karen Okawa; Commissioner to the Presbytery – Allyn Nakashima and Commissioner to UCC RMC – Lorraine Crouse.

Reports:

Finance – Benevolence and per capita were paid to the Presbytery and UCC this month. A question came up regarding funding of Nihon Matsuri, which we have not budgeted funds for the last 2 years as the festival has been canceled because of COVID. The expenses and profits from Nihon Matsuri will be an entry in the General Fund rather than Agape and Nichigo. The current budget will be adjusted after the event.

Buildings and Grounds – Regarding parking income, it was clarified that JCC is income tax exempt, but property tax is different and there is no exemption. Steve is working with Cascade and ABM to negotiate how much each party will contribute.

Education – A timeline for nominating church officers was presented that should be worked on throughout the year. We should start seeking possible candidates for positions in January and conduct training on what is expected in those positions.

Membership – An emergency contact list will be compiled to include a phone number for a family member or friend that can be reached in case of an emergency situation at church.

Personnel – Results of the member survey performed last month were reported. Pastor Haas has agreed to renew his contract for another year.

Worship – Easter events this year will include Maundy Thursday meal and service, Good Friday service, Easter Sunday breakfast hosted by the Men's group. A reservation was made at Sugarhouse Park for the annual Father's Day picnic.

Mission Study – The committee will have a final questionnaire by the end of the month and will begin an interview process with the congregation.

Deacons – See report on Page 4. The Deacons have also expressed interest in receiving training from the Presbytery as well. Contact information will be sent to the Presbytery Stated Clerk.

JACL Event – Wakasa Memorial

On Friday, April 21st and Saturday, April 22nd, ceremonies will take place in Salt Lake City and at the Topaz concentration camp in Delta, to honor the memory of James Hatsuaki Wakasa, who was walking his dog when he was killed by an Army guard on April 11, 1943, at Topaz. These events co-hosted by the Topaz Museum Board and Wakasa Memorial Committee, will mark the 80th anniversary of Mr. Wakasa's murder.

The Wakasa Monument, a 2,400-pound memorial stone, was erected in June 1943 near the fence at Topaz by Issei friends and members of the landscape committee, in defiance of the authorities' orders not to build a monument. Soon after, they were ordered by WRA administration to destroy the monument. The builders instead, buried the stone. The top was rediscovered in 2020 and lay in the ground for 78 years, until it was unearthed by the Topaz Museum Board and relocated to the Museum's courtyard in 2021. According to a museum spokesperson, it was done to protect it from vandalism and other acts of deliberate destruction.

Thereafter, a group has been assembled, including myself and Chris Merritt (Utah Historic Preservation Officer with the Utah State Historic Preservation Officer); Justin Henderson (Program Manager, Heritage Partnerships Program, National Park Service Regional Office Serving Department of the Interior Regions 6, 7, & 8); Topaz Board Members Ann Dion, Sherrie Hayashi and Hisashi Sugaya; and Wakasa Memorial Committee members Karen Kiyo Lowhurst, Masako Takahashi and Nancy Ukai. The purpose of this group is to determine the remediation of the Wakasa memorial stone, as well as the site itself.

The memorial events in Utah will require registration. The Friday evening event will be held at the Salt Lake City Buddhist Temple. An evening program will feature a presentation on the life of James Hatsuaki Wakasa, followed by a panel presentation of the group above but focusing on presentations by our Utah State Historical Preservation Office, National Park Service, as well as stone conservator John Lambert. They will discuss the long-term preservation of the Wakasa memorial stone and site. Dinner will also be provided that night.

At Topaz on April 22, a ceremonial walk will retrace Wakasa's steps from his barrack to the sacred place where he died. A brief interfaith ceremony will be held near the fence where he died. After the memorial walk, a ritual ceremony will be live, as well as live streamed to the Delta Community Center from the Wakasa memorial stone in the courtyard of the Topaz Museum in Delta, 16 miles from Topaz. Lunch to be provided. There are no costs for meals or transportation.
