Pastor's Message "Truth in Voting"

August 2024

Editor's Note: This month, Reverend Haas cedes his Pastor's Message to this article written by Cheryl A. Leanza. Ms. Leanza is a policy advisor at United Church of Christ (UCC) Media Justice Ministry. The UCC is a faith community rooted in justice that recognizes the unique power of the media to shape public understanding and thus society. For this reason, the UCC Media Justice Ministry, established in 1959, works to create just and equitable media and technology systems that give meaningful voice to diverse peoples, cultures and ideas. As Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson, the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ, explained as part of the Our Faith, Our Vote campaign, voting is an essential way for people of faith to bring about the just world we want to see. It is how we can love-in-action, as 1 John 3:18 teaches us.

Even when politics seems broken, we at UCC Media Justice see, every day, the tremendous impact of national and local elections. Do not give up, get out to vote, and encourage your friends and loved ones to do so also. Do not let forces arrayed against justice prevail in pushing you out of your democracy.

As part of our joint effort to ensure that everyone participates in our civic life, it is important to know about the hurdles that face us. In the lead-up to the 2024 presidential election, one place where our democratic processes face a significant challenge is from a deluge of disinformation and misinformation.

Misinformation is unintentionally false information. Disinformation is false and intends to mislead. Both can play a powerful role in negatively influencing public opinion and voter behavior.

Deceptive practices sow confusion among voters, spreading doubts about the mechanics of voting and the integrity of our electoral process. For example, misleading information about polling locations or inaccurate voting times can prevent voters from casting their ballots and skew election outcomes. Other deceptive information can cause us to lose hope and step away from the political process. Here's what UCC Media Justice will be watching out for:

- Disinformation campaigns targeting people of color that exploit language barriers and cultural nuances to spread false narratives and sow distrust in the electoral system to suppress voter turnout. Recent polling revealed that Black Americans disproportionately encounter lies online.
- The use of AI-generated content, including deep fakes. These technologies create convincing false videos and images that mislead voters, and they are on the rise. For example, early this year Joe Biden's voice was impersonated to influence the New Hampshire primary. This content complicates efforts to distinguish between genuine and fabricated information.
- Distrust in mainstream media and other traditional sources of information which has led to an
 increased reliance on social media for news. But social media platforms can be the worst
 place to go for reliable news because they are often rife with unverified and
 misleading content.

Although these developments are concerning, we can make powerful changes when we work together.

The annual Flu Shot Sunday will be held on **Sunday, September 15**, **2024** from **11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.** This year you can receive vaccinations for a number of illnesses – including pneumonia, shingles, COVID and the flu. A signup sheet will be posted on the Fellowship Hall bulletin board. On the day of the clinic, please bring your personal ID, proof of insurance or Medicare and also wear a short sleeved shirt/top.

This year a new provider will be administering the vaccinations. There is a pre-registration form to fill out to determine whether a particular vaccine is covered under your insurance or not. Contact Stephanie Mori-Nakao for a copy. By filling out the form ahead of time, the provider can perform the check before the $15^{\rm th}$ and you won't have to wait to get vaccinated.

On **Saturday, September 21, 2024**, we will be hosting a reception from 2:00 – 4:00 p.m. to celebrate our chapel's 100th year anniversary – "A Century of Loving Faith". We will also be celebrating with our other congregations which share our grounds and space, including the Anchored in Christ Free Wesleyan Church (celebrating their 10 year anniversary with our church) and the Kachin Trinity Church.

There will be a blessing starting at the garden, just east of our chapel, followed by our guest Wayne Osako (Orange County, CA) and the short documentary in the Fellowship Hall (see description below). The first issuance of the stamp was in Los Angeles, CA – Wayne Osako is working to have a special issuance of the stamp which will be for Utah! We encourage those attending to thereafter enjoy the archival, photographic display of our Utah Nisei, WWII Nisei, Congressional Gold Medal soldiers, and the archival, photographic display of our church, in our newly renovated chapel. Thank you to our own archivist Lorraine Crouse, and the J. Willard Marriott Library Special Collections, University of Utah.

We are also fortunate to hear our taiko drum performers and others from our church family, including the incomparable and beautiful singing by Liliena Manusiu Pupu'a.

The Go For Broke: Japanese American Soldiers of World War II Forever commemorative postage stamp recognizes an important part of our Nation's history. Approximately 33,000 American men and women of Japanese heritage patriotically served in the U.S. military during World War 2 despite the unjust incarceration of over 120,000 Japanese Americans in concentration camps.

Stamp Our Story: Honoring America

The all-Japanese American 100th/442nd Regimental Combat Team became one of the most distinguished and decorated units in U.S. history for their valor fighting in Europe. The 18-minute

documentary film "Stamp Our Story: Honoring America" tells the inspiring story behind this Stamp. The film has been featured at numerous film festivals nationwide and received the Heritage Award at the 2023 DisOrient Asian American Film Festival of Oregon. The Stamp Our Story Committee, which co-produced the film, led the campaign for the stamp since 2005, which included vital bipartisan support from Utah lawmakers and citizens. 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Updates from SLC NextGen JA

SLC NextGen JA is a group consisting of Salt Lake Buddhist Temple members, Japanese Church of Christ members, and the broader Japanese American community working to ensure that the community is included as key stakeholders in the planning of the SECC district. SLC NextGen JA is dedicated to amplifying the collective Japanese American voice of Salt Lake City through intergenerational collaboration that promotes the diverse voices of Japantown's past, present, and future.

Background:

Earlier this year, the State Legislature passed Senate Bill (SB) 272 which allows for the creation of a Capital City Revitalization Zone. The zone expands from the Delta Center to two blocks East, an area that includes Japantown (100 S and between 200 W and 300 W). Bill 272 allows the City to impose a 0.5% increase in citywide sales tax that would fund development of Smith Entertainment Group's (SEG) privately owned Sports, Entertainment, Culture, and Convention (SECC) District which impacts Japantown Street, the Japanese Church of Christ (JCC) and the Salt Lake Buddhist Temple (SLBT).

Update:

At the July 9th, 2024, SL City Council meeting, the City Council unanimously endorsed a Participation Agreement proposed by Smith Entertainment Group that included a rough plan for the redevelopment process of the SECC district. The Participation Agreement includes the following in regards to Japantown:


Two meetings a year with SEG and members designated by SLBT/JCC for the first three years to discuss SEG's development progress and provide input on revitalization and redevelopment of Japantown.

The City will provide at least \$5 million from a Public Benefits Account to revitalize Japantown.

SEG will activate the north side of 100 S. and minimize truck loading and unloading areas, create a pedestrian connection between the district and Japantown, incorporate Japanese architectural elements, and create historical markers approved by the Japanese American community.

A state-appointed Revitalization Zone Committee will review the agreement and will have 30 days from July 9th, 2024 to either approve or reject the agreement. If the Committee approves the agreement, the Council will consider it for final approval to impose the state tax increase by Dec. 31, 2024.

While Japantown was included in the Participation Agreement, there are still several factors to consider and planning discussions needed. As Community Leaders continue planning the development of the SECC District, we need to ensure we have an active voice in redevelopment planning. (Continued on page 6.)

The July Session meeting was held on Thursday, July 25, 2024.

Patty Price was unanimously officially ratified as Office Administrator.

Approved date and budget for 100th anniversary of the chapel on September 21 and 22.

Discussion on relocation of Presbytery office, baptism request, Session/Trustee representation and communication/process improvements.

Individual Reports:

Pastor: Pastor Haas thanked JCC volunteers for their efforts during the GA. Internal, Session and Trustees will still have to improve collaboration. Session called for a Joint Task Force whereas the Trustees prefer to continue Joint Meetings of both bodies. More important than the meeting structure is the fact that communication flows freely and quickly so we are all on the same page.

Building and Grounds: Working towards completion of the sanctuary for anniversary event in September.

Finance: The P&L and budget statements for the month of June were reviewed and discussed.

Personnel: PNC will resume interviews after developing second interview questions. Compensation package will be calculated. OA position has been filled by Patty Price. Japantown meetings continue. JCC members volunteered at SLBT Obon festival; in turn SLBT members will help at our future festivals.

Membership: JCC volunteers supported GA events – National Asian Presbyterian Council used our Fellowship Hall for their meetings and gave us a generous donation for the usage. Some volunteered in welcoming committee positions at the airport, TRAX station and Salt Palace. The JCC hosted a worship service and luncheon on June 30 and catered an event for the Synod of the Rocky Mountains on July 2.

Nichigo: Nerikiri class continues; the July class was held on the 9th and a makeup class on July 23.

Worship: Rev. Mike Clang was guest pulpit in July; Chaplain Wilde had a family emergency, so was unable to speak on July 21. Rev. Bob Nakaoka will be guest pulpit on August 18.

At UCC Media Justice, we joined with 200 organizations asking social media companies to implement election integrity policies. We are continuing to work to make traditional, broadcast media accountable to the communities they serve, so communities can rely on it. We support the Federal Communications Commission's quick action to sanction electoral deep fake phone calls and to establish transparency rules in political advertising. The UCC is pressing lawmakers, especially Congress, to pass legislation that would firmly prohibit deceptive practices and prevent voter intimidation by making it unlawful to knowingly provide false information, online or offline. Join our email list so you can help.

As individual members of the United Church of Christ community, here are some specific actions *you* can take to fight disinformation and misinformation:

#KnowYourFacts. Always check the accuracy of a video, story, or article from a reputable source before sharing it, using websites like Politifact, Snopes, or FactCheck.org. Or use the Southern Poverty Law Center's helpful guide for how to spot AI-generated disinformation in your social feed.

Don't amplify false narratives: Avoid sharing mis- or disinformation, even to debunk it. Instead, share factual content to contribute positively to online discussions.

Educate your circle: If you see friends or family sharing disinformation or misinformation, engage them with kindness and present correct information. Suggest they check the facts themselves. Don't get into a fight online. #KnowYourResponsibility #KnowYourLimits

Report disinformation: Use the support tools provided by social media platforms to report false information. You can also alert organizations like Common Cause through their disinformation tip lines. The FCC also accepts complaints and offers_tips on deepfake scams of all kinds.

Many of these pointers are part of UCC Media Justice's <u>#KnowPeaceOnline campaign</u> which offers six guideposts to a better world online.

UCC Media Justice invites you to join with us in praying during the 2024 election season:

God, help us, our neighbors and our political leaders to put our love for our world into action. As we prepare to vote in November and encourage our neighbors to do the same, let us be vigilant in verifying the information we share and courageous in confronting falsehoods. Call us to seek out truth and justice and educate ourselves and others during this critical election year. Help us to do that by giving us the perseverance to create a society where all people have access to reliable, trustworthy information from sources that are accountable to the communities they serve and that reflect the full diversity of our country.
